Fifty excited students and seven staff from Mount Barker Community College joined over 3,000 students at the 2025 School Sport WA SHS Country Week in Perth for an unforgettable week of competition, camaraderie, and fun.

MBCC fielded five teams: hockey, touch football, netball, and boys' and girls' volleyball. The adventure began Sunday, 29 June, with a long bus ride followed by dinner at the Cambridge International Food Court and a scenic walk around Optus Stadium.



The opening ceremony on Monday kicked off a week of action. Day One saw strong performances, with boys' volleyball, touch, and hockey teams all recording wins. That

night, students let off steam at Lazer Blaze, before ending with a chocolate prize for each team's "sportsperson of the day".

Tuesday brought double-headers. Hockey dominated with wins over Eastern Goldfields and Collie SHS, the latter a tight battle foreshadowing a grand final rematch. A movie night wrapped up the day.

Wednesday brought more success: netball defeated Manjimup, touch tied with Bethel in a thriller, and hockey stayed undefeated. Students enjoyed some downtime by the (freezing!) pool and shared a team dinner at Brando's Pizza.

Fatigue set in on Thursday. Despite this, hockey beat WA College of Agriculture Cunderdin after a delayed start, and touch earned a draw. Volleyball teams gave it their all in tight contests.

Finals Friday was full of heart. Netball and boys' volleyball finished strong with wins. Girls' volleyball showed big improvement. Touch

narrowly missed a title. But the highlight: MBCC's hockey team claimed the Boys B Division title with a 5-1 win over Collie, sweet revenge after last year's loss.

Throughout the week, students displayed resilience, sportsmanship, and MBCC pride. A week to remember, on and off the field!











Wait Mate!



If you're uneasy about primary school-aged children having smartphones, you're not alone - and there's a growing movement to support your stance.

<u>Wait Mate</u> is an Australian non-profit initiative founded by parents who aim to delay children's access to smartphones until at least high school. The movement connects like-minded families through a pledge system: once ten families from the same school year sign the pledge, it becomes active, fostering a peer support network.

Research indicates that early smartphone use in children is linked to addictive behaviours, increased anxiety, depression, disrupted sleep, and heightened exposure to cyberbullying. By collectively delaying smartphone access, parents can alleviate the peer pressure children face regarding mobile phone ownership.

Mount Barker Community College supports the Wait Mate pledge, encouraging families to "hit pause" on smartphones until high school. This collective approach promotes a more engaging, play-based childhood, free from early exposure to addictive devices.

Nurse Notes - Scoliosis


Scoliosis is an abnormal sideways curvature of the spine. It can be detected by a simple examination of the back.

The normal spine has three curves – one in the neck, on in the upper back and one in the lower back. These curves can be seen from the side, but when you look from behind the spine should appear straight. If the spine has a sideways curve, this is scoliosis.


